Their support is invaluable, and we look forward to expanding these initiatives in the coming year.

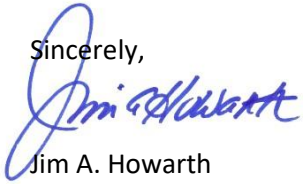
This report also highlights several key advancements the department made in 2024. We improved software applications to enhance operational efficiency, a significant step forward for managing day-to-day responsibilities. Additionally, fiscal responsibility remained a top priority for the department. One example of this was the acquisition of three well-maintained, fully equipped, used police cruisers, which replaced aging vehicles in our fleet. This strategic purchase allowed us to replace three cruisers for less than the cost of one new vehicle—an exceptional value for the Village of Greenhills.

Under Chief Ferdelman's leadership, officer salary restructuring in 2022 made the department competitive with similar agencies in Hamilton County. This continued to positively impact officer retention in 2024, with minimal personnel changes.

As Chief, I remain steadfast in my commitment to officer safety, professional development, and fiscal responsibility. From securing grants for essential equipment to exploring innovative solutions, the department balances operational needs with budgetary constraints.

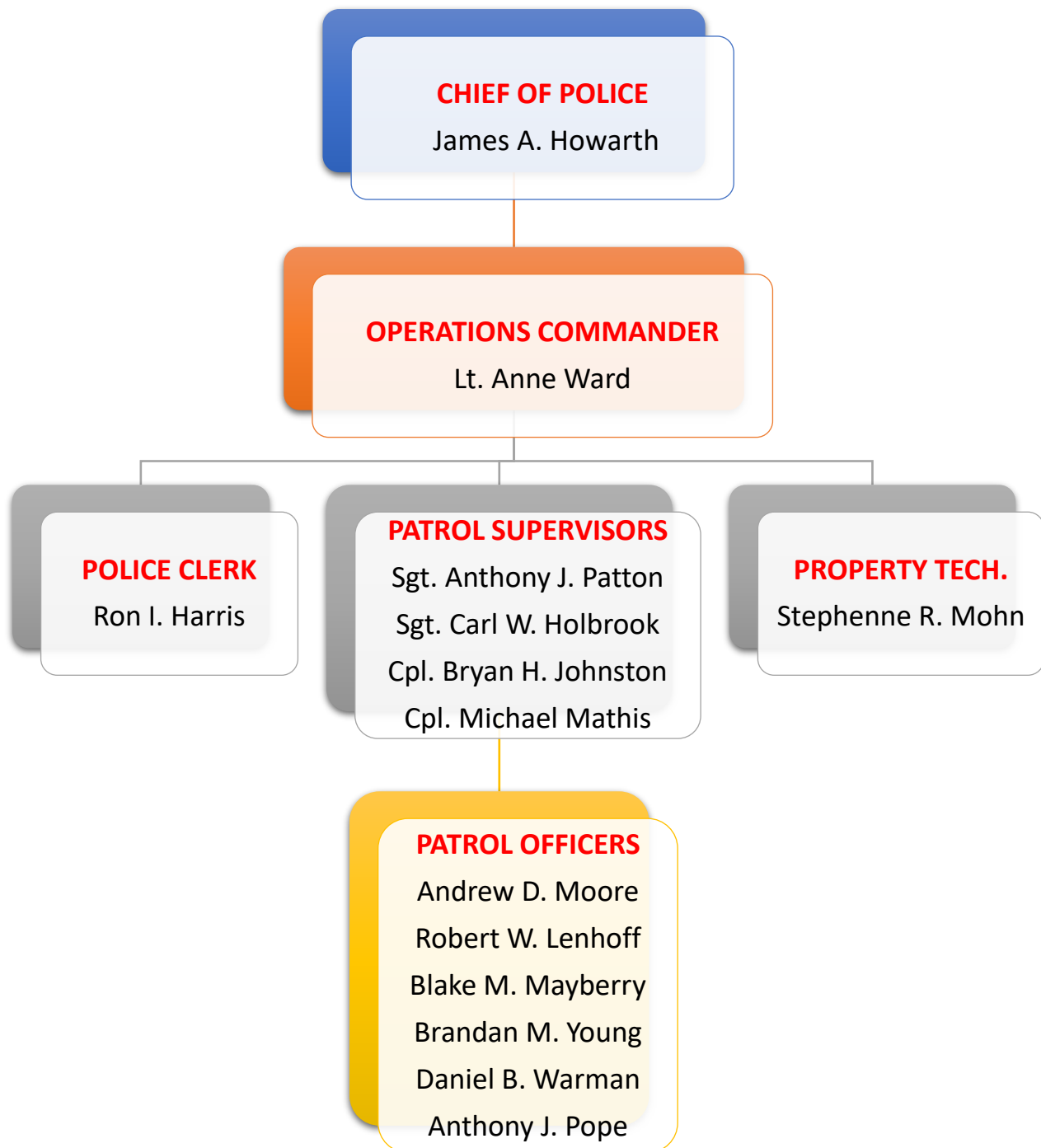

Personnel in Transition

Unlike previous years, personnel transitions during the 2024 calendar year were limited to one sworn position and one civilian role.

Mayor's Court Clerk: On May 20, 2024, Ronald I. Harris (*right*) joined the Greenhills Police Department as the new Mayor's Court Clerk. Ron retired from the Forest Park Police Department after a 26-year career, during which he served as both a police officer and a detective. While primarily serving as the Mayor's Court Clerk, Ron also handles various administrative tasks in the front office, bringing efficiency and effectiveness to the department. He replaced Vonda Secoy, who had served the community for over ten years before transitioning to the private sector. While Vonda is missed, Ron's professionalism and dedication have made him a valued asset, and his contributions are greatly appreciated.



Officer Addition: Officer Anthony (Tony) J. Pope (*below*) was sworn in as a full-time police officer on September 2, 2024. Tony graduated from the Scarlet Oaks Police Academy and previously served for three years as a corrections officer with the Hamilton County Sheriff's Department. Coming from a family with a rich law enforcement history, his father, Lt. Tony Pope, has served with the Forest Park Police Department for over 26 years. Officer Pope fills the vacancy left by Officer Zach Braun, who joined the Springfield Township Police Department after three years of dedicated service to Greenhills. Officer Pope's ceremonial swearing-in occurred during the monthly council meeting on September 24, 2024, with his family in attendance.

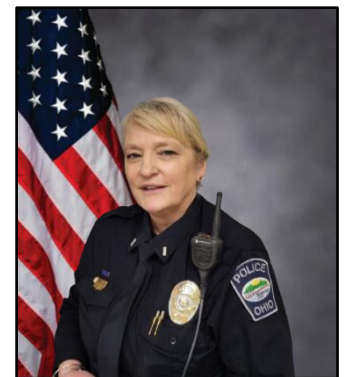


As of January 2025, the Greenhills Police Department is at full staffing levels, consisting of 12 sworn officers (10 full-time and two part-time), a Mayor's Court Clerk, and a Property Room Technician. Achieving full staffing enables the department to meet the community's needs effectively while maintaining the high standards expected of a nationally accredited agency.

Organizational Profile

Operations

Lieutenant Anne Ward, Operations Commander: Lieutenant Anne Ward (*right*) serves as the second-in-command of the Greenhills Police Department. She oversees daily operations, manages personnel training, and administers the department's records system. As the Accreditation Manager, she ensures compliance with CALEA standards and oversees related functions.



Crime Reporting

The department reports violent crimes—such as murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault—to the Department of Justice. In 2024, there were 14 violent crime offense reports, a significant increase from six in 2023. This rise was primarily due to aggravated assaults, which increased from

three in 2023 to 12 in 2024. The department documented 201 total criminal offense reports in 2024, up from 139 in 2023—a 44% increase. Key highlights include:

- **Assaults:** 27.4% of reports
- **Larceny (theft):** 20.4% of reports

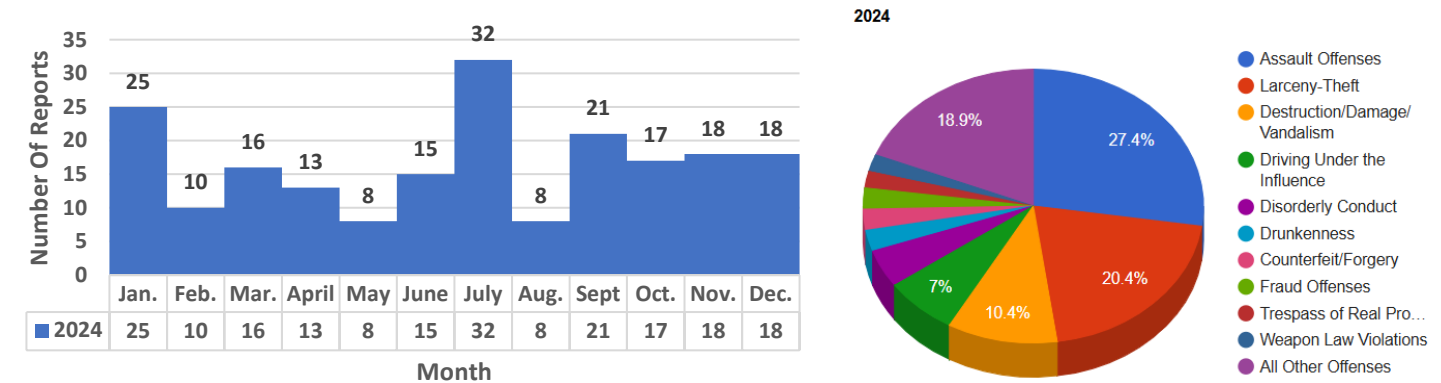
The department responded to 2,084 calls for service in 2024, initiating 9,873 records management entries, including incident reports, citations, field interview reports, warrant services, crash reports, and daily activities like business checks and school walks.

Crime Analysis

A detailed analysis of 2024 crime data revealed:

- **Breaking and Entering:** 3 reports, up from 2 in 2023
- **Theft Reports:** 41 reports, up from 36 in 2023
- **Violent Crime:** More than doubled as a result of aggravated assault and domestic violence
- **Stolen Motor Vehicles:** 3 reports, down from 7 in 2023
- **Robbery:** 1 report, down from 3 in 2023
- **Property Crime:** Virtually remained the same

The most significant increase was in assault cases, primarily attributed to domestic violence. The department partners with the Domestic Violence Enhanced Response Team (DVERT) through Women Helping Women to support victims and ensure they receive essential resources. Monthly DVERT meetings enhance officers’ ability to assist victims effectively.

Operational Highlights

Key programs and initiatives include:

- **DVERT Collaboration:** Provides resources and guidance for domestic violence victims.
- **Mobile Crisis Partnership:** This organization collaborates with the University of Cincinnati’s Mobile Crisis team to support mental health patients.
- **CALEA Compliance:** Maintains high standards of professionalism and operational excellence.

Accreditation

In 2024, the Greenhills Police Department underwent several critical assessments as part of its CALEA accreditation process:

- **Compliance Service Manager Reviews:** Conducted in April and October, focusing on 2023 and 2024. No issues were identified.
- **On-Site Assessment:** Held from December 8-11, 2024, led by Eric Kerns from North Carolina. The assessment was successful, with no issues reported.



The department anticipates receiving recertification at the 2025 CALEA Annual Conference in March, marking its fifth successful recertification since first achieving CALEA accreditation in 2008. Lieutenant Anne Ward, the Accreditation Manager, will attend the conference to accept the award on behalf of the department.

Chief Howarth remains committed to reviewing and updating policies to ensure continued compliance with CALEA standards, reinforcing the department's dedication to professionalism, transparency, and accountability.

Patrol Division Report

The Greenhills Police Department's Patrol Division provides 24/7 community policing services to the citizens of Greenhills. Eighty-seven years ago, the federal government established Greenhills as a Greenbelt community in northern Hamilton County as part of President Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal. The first residents moved to Avenell Lane on April 1, 1938, marking the beginning of this historic community and police department.

Staffing and Operations



The Patrol Division comprises two full-time sergeants and two part-time, well-trained, experienced corporals. Sergeants Patton (*left*) and Holbrook (*below*) serve as road patrol supervisors, ensuring the department's daily operations run smoothly. The division also includes six full-time patrol officers, who work ten-hour shifts with a rotation of days off every six weeks. Officers occasionally adjust their schedules to accommodate planned events, concerts, and festivals such as Harvest Fest and Light Up Greenhills to better serve the community.

Officers are encouraged to maintain high visibility and approachability while on duty. Their responsibilities include handling traffic complaints reported by residents and addressing issues such as speeding, stop sign violations, and other unsafe conditions. Officers are proactive in identifying solutions to these problems, including recommending the department's portable speed sign placement. Additional assignments include directed patrols, preventative patrols, building checks, vacation house checks, traffic enforcement, and school walks.



Traffic Enforcement and Accident Response

In 2024, the Patrol Division achieved notable results in traffic enforcement and accident response:

- **Traffic Citations:** Officers issued 473 traffic citations, including 257 for speeding.
- **Traffic Warnings:** 492 warnings were issued.
- **OVI Arrests:** The department conducted 14 OVI (Operating Vehicle Intoxicated) arrests, slightly down from 17 in 2023. Officer Mayberry led the department with nine OVI arrests.
- **Auto Accidents:** Patrol responded to 80 auto accidents, 16 of which occurred on private property. Of the 64 accidents reported to the State:
 - 49 were listed as “property damage only.”
 - 5 involved “possible injury.”
 - 10 resulted in “minor injuries.”
 - 0 were classified as “serious injury” or fatality.

Most accidents occurred on Winton Road or at intersections related to Winton Road, consistent with prior years.

Equipment and Resources

The Patrol Division operates five fully outfitted patrol vehicles. Each cruiser is equipped with tools necessary for officers to perform their duties effectively. Significant enhancements made in 2023 continued to benefit the division in 2024:

- **Rifle-Rated Ballistic Shields:** Implemented into each cruiser, these shields enhance officer protection during active threat responses.
- **AEDs:** Automated External Defibrillators were placed in every cruiser, and all officers received CPR/AED training to utilize these life-saving devices.

Recruitment and Training

Greenhills police officers undergo a rigorous hiring process, including testing, interviews, psychological assessments, polygraphs, and medical exams. In 2024, the department welcomed Officer Tony Pope, a tremendous addition to the team.

The department strongly emphasizes continued education and training to maintain its high standards of professionalism. All officers completed extensive training courses aligned with the Ohio Collaborative Initiative and CALEA (Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies) standards. This commitment ensures the department remains well-prepared to serve the community effectively.

Community Engagement

The Greenhills Police Department is deeply committed to fostering positive relationships with the community. Officers participated in numerous well-received events throughout the year, including:

- **Coffee with a Cop**
- **Cooking with the Cops**
- **Cookies with a Cop**
- **Manager's "Park Talks"**

These events provided valuable opportunities for officers to engage with residents in informal settings, strengthening trust and collaboration.

Division Highlights

The department entered 2024 fully staffed, with high morale among its officers. This is a significant achievement in today's challenging environment for law enforcement and reflects the excellent leadership of the command staff and the support of the Greenhills community. Officers take pride in serving the Village of Greenhills, contributing to its progress, and engaging positively with residents.

As the department looks ahead, it remains committed to providing exceptional service and ensuring the safety and well-being of all who live, work, and visit Greenhills. The Patrol Division looks forward to continuing its mission in 2025 and beyond.

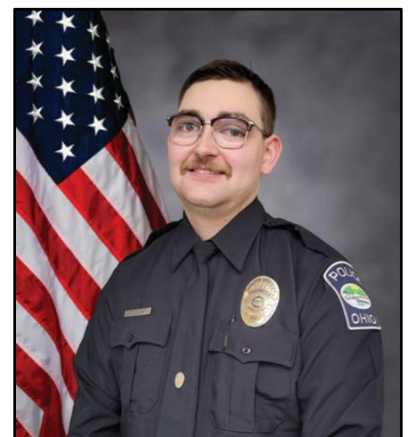

Training Summary

In 2024, the Greenhills Police Department completed all state-mandated training requirements, totaling **635 hours** of training for the year. This commitment reflects our dedication to maintaining the highest standards of professionalism and preparedness.

Specialized Training

Three significant training investments were made in 2024:

- **Firearms Instructor Development:** Officer Young attended a shotgun instructor course, leaving one final course—rifle instructor training—to complete in 2025. Once certified, Officer Young will become the department's primary firearms instructor.
- **Field Training Officer (FTO) Development:** Officers Lenhoff and Mayberry attended FTO training to address the department's need for additional field training officers. Prior to this, all but one FTO were supervisors, making this a crucial step to balance responsibilities.

Online and CALEA Training

The department met all training requirements outlined by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) through a combination of policy reviews and online learning. We continued utilizing the **Police One Academy** platform, which remains a cost-effective and efficient tool for our small department.

Joint Training Initiatives

For the second consecutive year, we partnered with the Forest Park Police Department to conduct joint training sessions. These included:

- Below 100 Training
- Defensive Driving
- Rifle Qualifications

These collaborative efforts enhanced skills and strengthened inter-agency relationships.

Continuing Professional Training (CPT)

All officers completed the **24-hour Continuing Professional Training (CPT)** requirement mandated by the Ohio Peace Officer Training Commission (OPOTC). The training was conducted both online and in person, covering the following topics:

- **Legal Updates** (2 hours)
- **Crisis Mitigation/De-escalation** (2 hours)
- **Marsy's Law & Victims' Rights** (1 hour)
- **National Integrated Ballistic Information Network (NIBIN)** (1 hour)
- **Additional Specialized Topics** (16 hours)

Summary

The comprehensive training program in 2024 ensured that all officers met state and accreditation requirements while enhancing their skills to serve the Greenhills community better.

Investigations

The Greenhills Police Department is fortunate to have two highly experienced Corporals—Mike Mathis (*right*) and Bryan Johnston (*below*)—who play a critical role in the department's investigative efforts and the development of our officers. With many years of service, both Corporals assist in conducting and coordinating criminal investigations, ensuring that cases are thoroughly followed up and supporting the patrol officers in their daily duties. Their expertise is particularly valuable during major cases, and their ability to assist in crime report follow-ups contributes significantly to maintaining community safety.



In addition to their investigative work, Corporals Mathis and Johnston offer



invaluable mentorship to younger officers, helping to guide them through complex cases and situations. Their willingness to step in and cover patrol duties during vacations and time off further strengthens the department's ability to provide continuous service to the community.

A key responsibility of our investigators, including Corporals Mathis and Johnston, is conducting thorough background checks for prospective police officers. These investigations are a vital part of the hiring process, ensuring that all candidates meet the highest standards of character and integrity. The background checks include reviews of employment history, education, military service, references, online presence, driving records, civil filings, and criminal history. This due diligence is essential to the Village's commitment to hiring officers who serve the community honorably and professionally.

In September 2024, a new officer was successfully hired following a comprehensive background check, ensuring that the department continues to uphold its commitment to excellence and safety.

Mayor's Court Clerk and Police Clerk

Ron Harris joined the Greenhills Police Department in May 2024, serving as the **Mayor's Court Clerk** and the **Police Clerk**. With 25 years of experience as a police officer for the Forest Park Police Department, Ron has brought a wealth of knowledge and expertise to the team. His seamless transition into these roles has made him an invaluable asset to the department and the community.

Responsibilities: In his dual capacities, Ron Harris manages a wide range of essential functions critical to the efficient operation of the Greenhills Police Department.



Mayor's Court Clerk

Key responsibilities include:

- Preparing court dockets ahead of each session;
- Collecting fees and fines and updating records to reflect court decisions;
- Utilizing the Ohio Attorney General's Office Collection Enforcement Section to recover unpaid fines through income tax refunds, lottery winnings, and other mechanisms;
- Preparing and issuing court orders for fines, intervention programs, and driving privileges, as well as submitting documentation to the Bureau of Motor Vehicles;
- Answering inquiries related to court procedures, dates, warrants, and payments;
- Attending training through the Central Ohio Association of Mayor's Court Clerks, covering topics such as docketing, expungements, record sealing, and cases involving driving under suspension or operating a vehicle while intoxicated.

Police Clerk

Key responsibilities include:

- Receiving incoming calls and processing payments for criminal and traffic fines;
- Making computer entries and managing citation and arrest paperwork;
- Assisting the public, attorneys, and officers with inquiries, accident reports, and case information;
- Receiving training through the Regional Crime Information Center (RCIC) system to maintain accurate and secure records of persons and property.

In addition, Ron serves in two critical roles:

- **Terminal Agency Coordinator (TAC):** Responsible for ensuring compliance with the Law Enforcement Automated Data System (LEADS), maintaining documentation, and overseeing security to ensure agency personnel meet testing and certification requirements.
- **Local Agency Security Officer (LASO):** Acts as the primary information security contact, disseminating alerts, maintaining security documentation, and assisting with audits of hardware and procedures. LASOs must complete initial and annual training to remain compliant.

Summary

Ron Harris's dual roles as Mayor's Court Clerk and Police Clerk are indispensable to the Greenhills Police Department's success. His diligent work ensures compliance with legal and administrative standards while providing exceptional support to the community and law enforcement personnel.

Property Room Overview

Stephenne Mohn, Property Room Technician:

The Greenhills Police Department's Property Room continues to operate under the strict oversight of Property Room Manager Stephenne Mohn, a part-time civilian employee who also serves as the full-time Property Room Manager for the City of Sharonville. Stephenne's extensive experience and knowledge make her an invaluable asset to our department. Her leadership ensures the meticulous handling and integrity of all property entrusted to the department.



In 2024, the Property Room processed 146 items, reflecting an 18% decrease from the 180 items submitted in 2023. Of these items, 77 were related to evidence, accounting for 53%. Additionally, 7% of items were confiscated, and 40% were found property, such as bicycles, license plates, and keys, or items held for safekeeping.

Drug-related items, including narcotics and drug paraphernalia, totaled 33 in 2024, a decrease from the 50 items submitted in 2023. The decrease can be attributed to the legalization of marijuana. Firearms submitted to the property room increased to seven in 2024 compared to four in 2023.

During the on-site CALEA assessment in December 2024, Assessor Eric Kerns praised Stephenne for her exceptional management of the Property Room. An audit conducted as part of the assessment revealed no discrepancies, underscoring the high standards maintained in the room's operations.

Stephenne Mohn's dedication to maintaining the integrity and security of the Property Room continues to be a cornerstone of the department's operations, and we are fortunate to have her on the team.

Looking into the Future

School Resource Officer (SRO) Program

In collaboration with Winton Woods City Schools Superintendent Steve Denney, the Greenhills Police Department has taken significant steps toward enhancing safety and building stronger relationships within the school community. Recognizing the importance of student and faculty safety, both parties dedicated extensive time and effort throughout 2024 to develop a comprehensive plan for a School Resource Officer (SRO) program.

After thoughtful discussions and hours of brainstorming, the Village Council agreed to create the two positions for this purpose. Village Council unanimously passed Resolution 2024-R27-S, establishing two part-time police officer positions to serve as school resource officers. A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between Winton Woods City Schools and the Village was signed and outlines the hiring of two part-time police officers who will serve as SROs at both the South Campus and Alternative School. The newly hired officers will be sworn Greenhills Police Officers, funded by the school district, and will work exclusively on school days when school is in session.

The SRO program aims to provide a consistent and visible police presence, enhancing students, faculty, and staff safety and security. The program will be fully operational by the start of the 2025 school year, and the hiring process is underway.

This initiative marks an important milestone in the ongoing efforts to foster positive relationships between law enforcement and students while ensuring a safe, educational environment for all.

Body-Worn Camera Grant Application

In 2024, the Greenhills Police Department applied for a grant of \$31,678.60 to support implementing a Body-Worn Camera (BWC) program. The grant will help cover the start-up costs and the program's first two years if awarded. The BWC program will enhance transparency and accountability by providing objective records of interactions, improve safety for officers and community members by promoting de-escalation, and support legal

proceedings by offering reliable, verifiable evidence. We anticipate the program's rollout in 2025, pending the grant's approval, and look forward to advancing this important initiative.

YEAR IN REVIEW - 2024

In our schools, throughout the year

The safety of our children is paramount. This is why, with the cooperation of the Winton Woods School District, we are excited to implement “school walks” at the South Campus, Early Childhood Central Campus, and Project Success alternative school in Greenhills. In December, 2023, the Police Department and the Winton Woods Local School District implemented the new program. Students and faculty will see on-duty officers randomly walking in school hallways sometime throughout the school day. Seeing a marked police vehicle on campus should not cause concern. Officers will be visible on campus, learning the campus layouts and building positive relationships with faculty, staff, and students. We realize this is something new and want everyone to be aware in the event they see a marked police cruiser parked in front of the school or in the event their child comes home saying they saw an officer at school—nothing to be alarmed about, just being proactive and doing our best to protect our children.

Speaking with Mr. Yung's 6th-grade social studies class was an honor. The class had just finished learning about the "Bill of Rights." When asked, "Who wants to be a police officer?" not many hands went up. After interacting for an hour and answering tough questions, I am confident the class has a future police officer.

Training – Single Officer Response

Officer Rob Lenhoff and Officer Andy Moore attended Single Officer Response to an Active Threat (SORAT) training offered by the Ohio Peace Officer Training Academy in London, Ohio. Officer Lenhoff and Moore, day-shift officers, have done a great job completing school walks and interacting with faculty, staff, and students during the school day. This 2-day course was geared towards Patrol Officers and School Resource Officers. Officers were taught legal aspects of the use of force and response to an active threat with weapons such as edged weapons, firearms, and Improvised Explosive Devices (IED). Officers were also taught movement principles, room entries, officer link-ups, and post-incident concerns. Best to be trained, but training we hope we never need!



Training: Impaired Driver

Officer Zach Braun and Officer Dan Warman attended Advanced Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement (ARIDE) hosted by the Ohio Peace Officer Training Academy. This two-day course provided officers general knowledge related to drug-impaired driving and promotes the use of Drug Recognition Experts (DRE). During the class officers learn how to observe, identify, and articulate the signs of impairment related to drugs, alcohol, or a combination of both in order to reduce the number of impaired driving crashes. Both officers also received an update and refresher on the Standardized Field Sobriety Testing (SFSTs) and successfully passed an SFST proficiency evaluation.

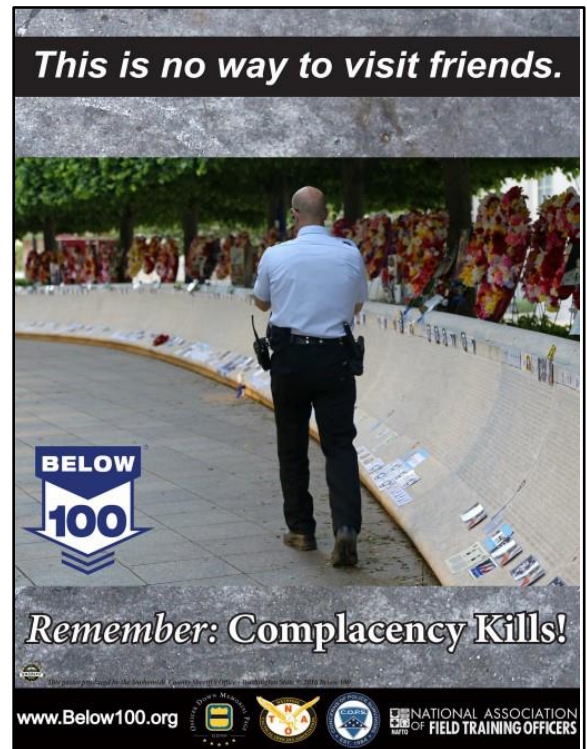
YEAR IN REVIEW – April

Training: “BELOW 100”

On April 3rd, all officers attended the “Below 100” training hosted by the Forest Park Police Department. The Below 100 (a 501c3 organization) is a national initiative created to assist in reducing the number of line-of-duty deaths to below 100 officers each year, something the United States has not seen since 1943. Below 100 identifies five critical tenets by which officers can improve their safety and return home after their tour of duty. The five tenets encouraged in Below 100 training are:

1. Wear Your Seat Belt
2. Wear Your Vest
3. Watch Your Speed
4. WIN – What’s Important Now
5. Complacency Kills

The vision of the training program is to eliminate preventable line-of-duty police deaths and severe injuries through compelling common-sense training designed to focus on areas under the officer’s control. The training class provided many videos and real-life instances, which were preventable, that took the life of a police officer. The training class was an excellent reminder for all officers in attendance. Training instructors Lieutenant Tony Pope and Sergeant Jackie Dryer of the Forest Park Police Department did an outstanding job presenting the 4-hour training session. We appreciate Police Chief Bill Arn's collaboration and the fact that our officers had the opportunity to attend this valuable training.

During the patrols, our officers will assess the security of your property, looking for any signs of suspicious activity or vulnerabilities that may need attention.

In case of any concerns or emergencies, our officers will contact you or your designated emergency contact immediately to ensure prompt action is taken.

By registering for a Vacation Check, you can enjoy your vacation with added confidence, knowing that our dedicated officers are looking after your home.

Sharing vacation plans or photos while you're away can be risky as it can inform people that your home is empty and potentially attract unwanted attention. It's always best to wait until you return to share those memories. Safety first!

The safety of our children is paramount!

As the new school year begins, we want to remind everyone of the important safety measures that keep our children and school zones secure.

Watch for School Buses: School buses are now active on our roads. Please be vigilant and prepared to stop when you see a school bus with its stop sign extended and lights flashing. This is not only a legal requirement but a crucial part of ensuring our children's safety as they board and exit the bus. State law requires the driver of a vehicle, upon meeting or overtaking from either direction any school bus stopped to receive or discharge any school child, stop at least ten feet from the front or rear of the school bus and shall not proceed until such school bus resumes motion, or until signaled by the school bus driver to proceed. Situations in which a highway has been divided into four or more traffic lanes, a driver of a vehicle need not stop for a school bus **approaching** from the opposite direction which has stopped for the purpose of receiving or discharging children.



Pay Attention to Pedestrians: Many children will be walking or biking to school. Always be on the lookout for pedestrians at crosswalks and near schools. Children can sometimes be unpredictable, so extra caution is needed.

Observe Speed Limits: Speed limits in school zones are designed to protect our children. Please adhere to these limits, especially during drop-off and pick-up times. Reduced speeds give drivers more time to react and ensure a safer environment for everyone.

Avoid Distractions: When driving near schools, stay focused on the road. Avoid distractions such as mobile phones, and be fully attentive to your surroundings.

Support School Initiatives: Support local school safety programs and initiatives. Your involvement helps create a safer community and reinforces the importance of safety for our children.

Let's work together to ensure that our schools are safe places for learning and growth. By being vigilant and considerate drivers, we can contribute to a secure environment for all our students.

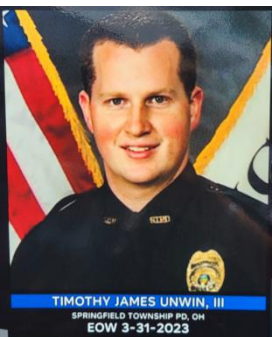
Property Room Technician Stephenne Mohn celebrates three years with the department

Incident Involving Firearm at School

On September 11th, 2024, as the students arrived at school, they were met by faculty, staff, and Greenhills Police Officer Andy Moore. Through careful and decisive actions, it was determined that the student was in possession of a loaded firearm. The student was arrested immediately and without incident.

We are incredibly proud of the proactive measures taken by school administration, faculty, and Officer Moore. Their quick response reflects the strong partnership between our schools and local law enforcement, ensuring that the safety of our students remains a top priority. While this was an isolated incident, it serves as a reminder that our community's vigilance is essential in protecting our schools. Incident Involving Firearm at Winton Woods Alternative School

Greenhills, Ohio – September 11, 2024 – The Greenhills Police Department responded swiftly this morning to Winton Woods Alternative School, located in the Community Building at 8 Enfield Street, Greenhills, Ohio.

Winton Woods City Schools alerted the department on the morning of **September 11, 2024**, that a 16-year-old student may have been in possession of a firearm on the prior day, **September 10, 2024**. Upon receiving the report, it was determined that the individual was enroute to the school at the time of notification. Officers were dispatched immediately, and a Greenhills Police officer awaited the student's arrival at the school.

Upon arrival, the individual was promptly detained and questioned. It was determined that the student was in possession of a loaded firearm. The 16-year-old was immediately placed under arrest and transported to the Greenhills Police Department.

The individual has been charged with:

- Two (2) counts of **Illegal Conveyance of a Deadly Weapon in a School Safety Zone**
- One (1) count of **Inducing Panic**.

The student was subsequently transported to the **Hamilton County Juvenile Detention Center**.

Greenhills Police Chief Jim Howarth stated, "The swift action taken by the school administration and officers helped ensure the safety of the school community. We take these incidents very seriously, and our department will continue to work closely with school officials to maintain a safe environment for all students and staff."

The police department believes this is an isolated incident and has no evidence to believe it is related to recent school violence media posts.

The total purchase price for all three vehicles was just \$39,000—only \$13,000 per vehicle to include equipment.

This strategic purchase addresses the department's aging fleet and allows the village to implement a long-term vehicle replacement schedule. The village has saved tremendously on costs by opting for these well-maintained preowned cruisers. Acquiring a **single** new cruiser would have cost over \$55,000 after purchasing and outfitting the vehicle, making this opportunity a financial win for Greenhills.



These vehicles will soon receive updated Greenhills graphics and be ready for service by the end of the year. Their dark metallic gray color will distinguish them from the current black fleet, but rest assured, the same dedicated officers will be behind the wheel, continuing to serve the community with dedication and professionalism.
